Focus on Informed Decision Making

Building Awareness:

- Where are you at where do you want to go? –interests, motivation and dreams
 - myBlueprint assessments to ascertain strengths, skills, and interests
- Understanding:
 - The educational route(s) for a given career
 - Program eligibility (educational background/experience)
 - The value of enrichment and pre-postsecondary experiential programs
 - Exploration of schools and program options for postsecondary areas of study that align with strengths, skills and interests
 - How postsecondary works: the application process and admission criteria
 - The value of active engagement in school life and service learning

Choices – Best FIT:

- o criteria to consider to find the Best FIT (program and school)
 - Interests, strengths, learning style, location, campus environment (size, academic, social), cost
- Generating a list of programs and school considerations to help finetune options
- Evaluating admission offers consideration in final decision for Best FIT

Backup Plan:

- Preparing for the "what if" factor
 - recognizing the path is not always straight and provide guidance to manage potential setbacks
- Understanding the value of developing transferable skills

Preparing Effective Postsecondary and Scholarships Applications

(expertise Canada, US, UK, Australia)

1:1 support for:

- The 'how to' nuts and bolts of applying
- Developing a personal application timeline
- Assistance with application processes
- Standardized testing prep strategy and planning
- Application essays/Personal Statements of Experience brainstorming and essay review to develop authentic, strong personal voice and impactful statements
- Postsecondary/Major Scholarship interview-prep and coaching

NSA Grade 11 year - Post Secondary Planning Guide

The students should:

- Realize the importance of doing their best work in their grade 11 year; June grades form the basis for early applications to the US and UK and possible "early offers" in Canada
- Reflect on which courses they *enjoy most and why*; which they do best in and why
- Balance their NSA acadmice and athletics and pursue additional extracurricular involvement and responsibilities that are *meaningful to YOU/help you grow – take a risk outside of comfort zone*: balance of leadership, initiative, action, and meaningful service (BEYOND CAMP)
- Ask questions about the postsecondary experiences of friends and family
- Begin to identify **good FIT(s):** (academic, area of study, personal, community, location, size etc.) through serious research on postsecondary programs using the NSA resources, *myBlueprint* and the internet; attend presentations by postsecondary representatives etc.
- Use myBlueprint to record postsecondary research, rep visit notes
- Consider a job shadow in an area of interest
- Volunteer (on a regular basis) in an activity that might be related to a potential career
- Meet with NSA Postsecondary Advisor
- Develop a resume -and submit to NSA Postsecondary Advisor for review
- Visit at least two postsecondary campuses
- <u>US schools:</u> sign up for the **SAT** (*March, May*) <u>or **ACT** (*February, April, June*) reasoning tests consider taking SAT subject tests in June; draft application essays over the summer</u>
- <u>UK schools:</u> if applying to medical programs or Oxbridge, do significant research and work on the personal statement during the summer. Speak to NSA Postsecondary Advisor asap.

The parents should:

- Support your student athlete in finding the appropriate balance between academic, athletic and other extracurricular commitments; help guide to develop strategies for good time management
- Help your student athlete to reflect on individual strengths and weaknesses, areas for growth
- Encourage student athlete to explore interests and non-skiing talents through engagement in 1-2 extracurricular /summer activities
- Discuss possible postsecondary programs and career choices with openness to your student athlete's goals and potential postsecondary areas of study/pursuits
- Plan to make a number of campus visits with your student athlete
- Help your student athlete to draft a plan of action for postsecondary research including scholarship
 options BUT it is important that your son/daughter is the one evaluating programs and schools to
 determine good FIT (academic, program of study, personal, community, size, location etc.),
 contacting admission offices etc.

NSA support:

- Individual counselling appointments with all student athletes (and their parents, if the family wishes) initial first meeting by the end of Quad 3
